Minister's Message

Reflection on Lent

On Ash Wednesday this year, we will hear (or read) the words of the prophet Joel chapter 2, vs. 12: "Even now, says the Lord, return to me with your whole heart". *Now*: an urgent word, not allowing for delay. Return to the Lord *now* and He will give you his grace and his forgiveness. Ask for his forgiveness and his blessings and your wishes will be fulfilled *now*. God is always ready to bless us and to pour out his grace upon us. As we begin the season of Lent this is the first thing that we need to know and to remember.

So, if God is always eager to forgive us, why do we need the season of Lent? Well, even though it is always *now* for God, it isn't so for us. We need to have, planned for us, a certain time or season like Lent to remind us to live more simply and to look to God more deeply. We need to increase our prayer time, our fasting and our almsgiving to shake up our routines and make us more willing to turn to God.

The Gospel for Ash Wednesday speaks to the three "pillars" of Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Jesus tells us in Matthew 6: "When you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, who love to stand and pray in the synagogues and on street corners so that others may see them." ... "When you pray, go to your inner room, close the door, and pray to your Father in secret." ... "Your Father knows what you need before you ask him". Jesus then gives us the words to The Lord's Prayer, a prayer that we all know very well.

Jesus teaches us about almsgiving, the second pillar of Lent. He says, "(But) take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them" ... "But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right is doing, so that your almsgiving may be secret". To me this is saying to not offer alms in front of others to make them think you are so wonderful and generous and such a great person. God will see, in secret, how loving and generous to others you have been and will reward you in secret. Finally, Jesus speaks about fasting. He says, "When you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites. They neglect their appearance, so that they appear to others to be fasting" ... "But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face" ... "And your Father who sees what is hidden will repay you". To me Jesus is saying to not make yourself "look" like you are fasting by not taking care of your appearance; instead you should clean yourself up and look nice. To others you may not look like you are fasting but, then, you aren't fasting to make an impression on others. Fast so that you are seen by God who is hidden; he will see what is hidden in you and repay you.

Have a blessed, faith-filled Lent. Return to God with all your heart. You will be blessed indeed! God's peace.

Spiritual Assistant's Message

Doing what is ours to do.

As you read this, Lent is about to begin, and we know “what is ours to do.” It comes across loud and clear in article 7 of our Holy Rule: “United by their vocation as brothers and sisters of penance, and motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel, let them (US!!) confirm their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel itself calls “conversion”. Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily.....”

We are admonished on Ash Wednesday to “turn away from sin” as the ashes are imposed. Well, my best guess, is if we are trying to “live the gospel life after the manner of St. Francis...” we probably aren't really big sinners, but we can work on our little faults as we go about reflecting on and doing the traditional Lenten fast, almsgiving and prayer.

How about disturbing our comfort level? Does it take extra effort to get to Stations of the Cross at your parish, perhaps because you have worked all day and want nothing more than to take off your shoes and sit in your easy chair? I have a “meet you half way” suggestion. How about resting in that easy chair for say, half-hour and then

heading off for church and the Stations. It's only once a week, after all.

OK, back to the easy chair now. Get some good Lenten reading – the kind that holds your attention and leads you to the prayer and contemplation that is the basis of all that we do. Article 4 of the Holy Rule tells us that should devote ourselves to careful reading of the Gospel so that we may go from Gospel to Life and life to Gospel! A personal favorite of mine is the Gospel of the Passion according to St. Matthew. It helps me to focus. Also for my Lenten reading this year I am going back to an old favorite and re-reading it. *Praying with Clare of Assisi* by Franciscan Sisters Ramona Miller and Ingrid Peterson.

As for fasting, I am going back to my old favorites. I'll turn off the TV after the evening news and pray the Franciscan Crown Rosary. I'll fast from some of my favorite creature comforts – like that afternoon coffee and muffin. You get the idea – of what will your fasting consist?

I know we all have our favorite Lenten almsgiving practices and we should continue, but can we make ourselves part of the almsgiving by giving of ourselves and our time to help a neighbor, a shut in friend – maybe just a phone call?

However you spend your Lent I wish you peace and good and ask the Sacred Heart of Jesus to surround you with His love and fill your lives with His abundant blessings.

Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC)

Grace and peace to you, sisters and brothers! February 19, 2017 marks the 75th anniversary of the signing of Executive Order 9066 that called for the incarceration of 120,000 Japanese Americans during World War II. Every year, the Japanese American community around the country remember President Franklin D. Roosevelt's signing of EO9066 as a reminder of the fragility of civil liberties in times of crisis, and the importance of remaining vigilant in protecting the rights and freedoms of all. It's known as Remembrance Day.

We say things like "Never Again" or "Never Forget", "Remember Pearl Harbor", but what do they really mean? Given current events, we seem only too happy to forget our country's sins when we're afraid, and especially when our 'enemy' isn't white. Our government didn't illegally incarcerate German or Italian Americans during World War II. Just the Japanese. And after the war, these citizens had to start over from nothing because their homes and businesses had been seized and sold by the US government. The Japanese Americans who served in the 442nd infantry during the war were ineligible for GI bills and other benefits received by other veterans, despite their being the most decorated army unit in our country's history. They hold this record to this day.

Our country has a tragic history of mistreating her citizens and then forgetting about it; only the survivors bear the scars incurred through no fault of their own. This is directly repugnant to the Gospel, and to the values our nation claims to champion. I keep coming back to these words by Frederick Douglass; they are just as true and relevant as when he first wrote them:

"America will not allow her children to love her. She seems bent on compelling those who would be her warmest friends, to be her worst enemies. May God give her repentance before it is too late, is the ardent prayer of my heart. I will continue to pray, labor, and wait,

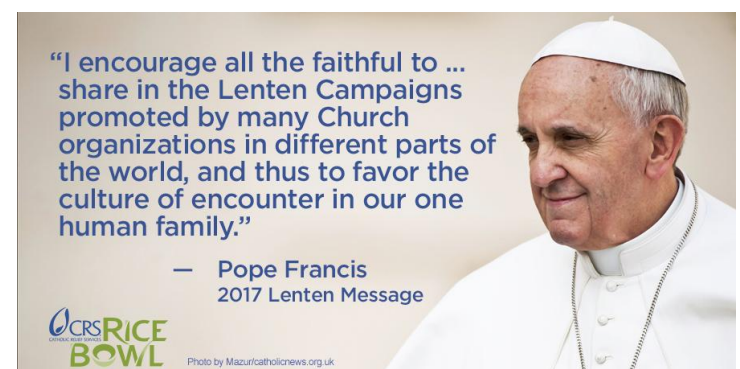
believing that she cannot always be insensible to the dictates of justice, or deaf to the voice of humanity."

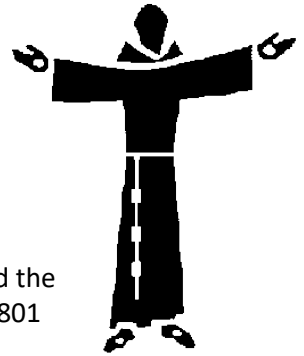

Enclosed please find the Registration Form and Schedule for this year’s Candidates Retreat to be held the weekend of March 18th & 19th, 2017. As in the past, the Retreat’s location will be Mayslake Village, 1801 35th St., Oakbrook IL, 60523. The focus of this year’s retreat is ‘Christ’s Beatitudes’.

As Franciscans, we are called to live in the spirit of continual conversion, and annual retreats are an important way of maintaining that important spirit. (Const. Art. 13). And even if candidates have attended previous retreats, they should find this this year’s topic inspirational and beneficial. Please encourage candidates, inquirers, along with formation directors and formation team members to attend. The expectation is those attending will be able to attend *both days*. Of course, if attending both is not possible, one day is better than not attending at all.

It is our hope of the Regional Formation Team that the Retreat will give everyone a better appreciation of the gift God has given them by leading them to the Franciscan path. But as St. Francis always stressed, gifts from God are not to be held and possessed, but passed on “through a holy activity, which must shine before others by example.” (2ndLF).

Attached is the intended syllabus of our two-day retreat. The Beatitudes will be presented over the course of both days; each presentation followed by time for quiet reflection; attendees may want to bring a journal. There will also be time for social interaction amongst all in attendance and, of course prayer.

The cost is modest. Just \$40 for the two days (\$25 for one day), and will cover a continental breakfast, lunch and handouts. Checks should be made payable *Mother Cabrini Regional Fraternity OFS*.
