# Minister's Message

Dear brothers and sisters,

This month's article was going to be easy: write about the National Chapter and visitation from CIOFS (the General Presidency of the Order). There's one little problem with that: I never made it to Chapter. What started out as a two-night side trip with my mother before the meeting turned into three weeks with her in her final illness. I was greatly blessed that the National Fraternity kept us in prayer throughout Chapter and afterwards. I thank all of you for your prayers and expressions of sympathy. It is at times like this that I am particularly grateful that I am a Secular Franciscan; we ARE family!

Such an experience of the love and grace that we are capable of at our best reminds me how far I am from living that ideal. Sadly, it's not only our dealings with everyone else that fall short; we may be family, but we sometimes fight like family, too. As we prepare to celebrate the Incarnation, a brief examination of conscience may help us approach family, friends, and our Franciscan brothers and sisters with the kind of love we are called to share – the love with which Christ loves us.

- 1. How often do I remember to "seek to encounter the living and active person of Christ in [my] brothers and sisters" [Rule 5]? Do I try to put this into practice more particularly with people with whom I disagree? With those whom I dislike?
- 2. How well do I "accept all people as a gift of the Lord and an image of Christ" [Rule 13]?
- 3. Do I treat everyone "with a gentle and courteous spirit" [*Rule* 13]?
- 4. Am I "ready to place [myself] on an equal basis with all people" [*Rule* 13]?
- 5. Do I "create a spirit of welcome and an atmosphere of fraternity everywhere" [Constitutions 18.2]?
- 6. Am I committed to opposing "every form of exploitation, discrimination, and exclusion" and against "every attitude of indifference in relation to others" [Constitutions 18.2]?

- 7. If married, how well does my relationship with my spouse "bear witness in the world to the love of Christ for His Church" [Rule 17]?
- 8. Do I consider my "own family to be the first place in which to live their Christian commitment and Franciscan vocation" [Constitutions 24.1]?
- 9. Do I "seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue" [Rule 19]?
- 10. Do I "[trust] in the presence of the divine seed in everyone" [Rule 19]?
- 11. Do I believe "in the transforming power of love and pardon" [Rule 19]?
- 12. Do I "strive to bring joy and hope to others" [*Rule* 19]?
- 13. How do I help to make my fraternity "a visible sign of the Church, the community of love" [Rule 22]?
- 14. In my fraternity, do I "promote mutual understanding and ... see to it that the atmosphere of [the] meetings is welcoming and that it reflects joy" [Constitutions 26.2]?

I know I have ample opportunities for daily conversion represented in this list! No matter how far we may be from fulfilling the ideals of our way of life, it is good to remember that our Rule concludes with this blessing of St. Francis: "May whoever observes all this be filled in heaven with the blessing of the most high Father, and on earth with that of his beloved Son, together with the Holy Spirit, the Comforter." May we be blessed here and now as well as in heaven!

# Spiritual Assistant's Message

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Before I say anything else, I want to express my pleasure and appreciation to all of those good people who came to the Mother Cabrini regional celebration held at St Peter's Church in the Loop on the 13th of November and to especially and profoundly thank the many sisters and brothers who tirelessly labored to produce this gracious and plentiful event.

As I am still floating and fluttering from the Franciscan Study Pilgrimage from which I recently returned I wanted to tap into some of that for your reflection. So today I would like to present a little something about two women who were an essential part of the movement of the Franciscan spirit from the very beginning. I recall first my visit to an enchanting site called Le Chella known to Francis and to us as a place of solitude up in the mountains outside of Cortona in Tuscany. This place full of Franciscan history and legend, one of my favorite discoveries, is at the top of the list of places where I would like to return. That part of the country is also known for the strong presence of the lav Franciscan movement of the brothers and sisters of penance which is the foundation of today's Secular Franciscan Order. And first among them was Margaret of Cortona whose life was uniquely broken and then reformed, recovered, and reinvented. There was severe turbulence and tension in her life as well as some great examples of service. She served the poor and infirmed, built a hospital, and she was a much sought after midwife. She was engaged in pastoral relationships with the friars, challenging them and providing them with spiritual direction. She was also well known as a spiritual director and counselor among the people of the region far and wide.

The memorial of Margaret of Cortona is celebrated according to the Franciscan calendar on May 16<sup>th</sup>. I would encourage you to read about her perhaps from her biographer the friar Giunta Bevegnati who refers to her as *la poverella*. Another good source of information is the Franciscan Institute at St Bonaventure University which publishes The Franciscan Heritage Series. Margaret of Cortona is presented in volume 7.

The other Franciscan woman that I would like to mention briefly is our Mother Clare whose life and legend is much better known to us. I recommend that each fraternity has available a copy of The Lady - Clare of Assisi: Early Documents from New City Press. The Lady Clare's life shines like a beacon of light upon example of the and her contemplative Franciscan spirit and heart guides us closer to God, the source of all good. I would like to share with you one of the brightest gems of her insight. It comes toward the end of her famous second letter to St Agnes of Prague, where she directs the Noble Queen to gaze, consider, and contemplate the poor Christ; her bridegroom, with a longing to imitate. Let us all acknowledge these Franciscan words and put them into practice in our daily lives of prayer and Gaze upon Christ, consider Christ, and contemplate Christ.

Finally then let me wish you a blessed Advent journey and a Happy Christmas.

As you read this the season of Advent - a time of waiting and of hopeful anticipation - has begun. The familiar hymns of the season bring us to an air of quiet expectation. No "Gloria" is sung during Advent. Often during this season we sing "O Come Divine Messiah" which expresses our longing for the Lord, the God of unconditional love.

"God is love and he who abides in love abides in God and God in him." Advent, then, invites us to reflect on the love God has for us and for this reason God became man.

Amid all the hustle and bustle of preparation for the celebration of Christ's birth, we are easily distracted; shopping to do, Christmas cards to write, dinners to plan and attend, and parties that are so much a part of the time leading up to Christmas.

How do we focus on the coming Divine Messiah in the midst of this clamor, rush and myriad of distractions? Why not take 5 or 10 minutes each day to do some reading and reflection on the great gift of the Incarnation? This is a good time to re-read and reflect on the story of the first Nativity scene our Holy Father Francis created at Greccio. The story stirs vivid imagery and we imagine ourselves observing and participating in that momentous event.

Many of us have a Nativity scene (Creche) set up in our homes during the Advent and Christmas season. We can take a few minutes of quiet reflection, sitting before it and becoming aware of the love of God; the reason for the Incarnation.

In the 7 days from December 17th to the 23rd, before and after the Magnificat, we pray the "O antiphons." They are called this because they all begin with the word "O" and are the basis for the hymn "O Come, O Come, Emanuel." They offer an opportunity to reflect on God's attributes, affording an opportunity for us to reflect and thank God for all that God is and does for us, out of God's own divine love.

Finally, it is important for us to remember the needy and less fortunate who may not have food, shelter or anyone to visit them. Let us search our hearts for the ways we can be God's love made present to them.

In conclusion I wish you all a very blessed and holy Christmas and pray the Sacred Heart of Jesus surround you with His love and fill your hearts with His abundant blessings.
