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Minister's Message

Dear brothers and sisters.

As I write this, we are headed into the coldest weather so far this season. Normally, I'd be contemplating the fact that Lent will be starting soon, but this year Ash Wednesday is March 9, so Lent is a subject for next month! We have an unusually long stretch of liturgical "Ordinary Time" this winter - more than just a bridge between Christmas and Lent - but it's still an "in between" time to me.

The cycle of nature and the cycle of the Church both include quiet times where not much seems to be happening, followed by bursts of activity and growth. While our culture discourages quiet and creates the expectation that we should be busy and either productive or entertained 24x7, as Franciscans we know better. We understand that to be healthy Christians, prayer and contemplation must be the soul of all we are and do (Rule 8). For some of us (me in particular), this understanding is knowing that I should eat healthy foods, exercise, and get enough sleep - but knowing and doing are two different things! This is one of those topics for daily conversion (and Lenten practice).

Before we get to Lent, I suggest that we all try to embrace whatever opportunities for quiet we have in this season. Whether you sit quietly with the Lord, take a nap, or bundle up and go out for a walk, it's a good time to be gentle with yourself, catch your breath, and give God a chance to get your attention. There are almost certainly changes in your life that you haven't fully absorbed yet; give them - and yourself - a chance. What new possibilities is the Holy Spirit nudging you toward? How is God calling you today? Maybe you'll get the message while doing the dishes, or the laundry, or a crossword puzzle. If we are trying to be open to God's love, we'll start becoming more and more aware of how that love comes to us every day.

This love that comes to us in the quiet, slow times makes it possible for us to grow and flourish in the times of activity and change. While we look forward to spring, let's be grateful for winter!

I hope to see many of you at the Apostolates Workshop on February 26. We have an excellent opportunity to prepare for Lent by considering ways in which we can better care for creation, and we also will get to learn more about the good work the Franciscan Action Network (FAN) is doing for our entire Franciscan family. I don't know about you but I was profoundly moved by memorial gathering held in Tucson when our President spoke such healing words and introduced us to the heroes and survivors as well as sharing stories about those whose lives were taken away. We especially heard about congresswoman Gabrielle Gifford's and her devoted husband, astronaut Mark Kelly. Amidst all the awful sorrow and pain, there was presented this great opportunity for strong hope and the potential for optimistic recovery, especially when the President with the permission of Ms. Gifford's husband, proclaimed that "Gabbie had opened her eyes" which caused me to weep for joy and the crowd in attendance to erupt with applause and a standing ovation. JPIC - Apostolic Action Workshop!

Yep, it's coming up on Saturday, February 26 at Mayslake Village, and our main focus will be on a new process developed by Franciscan Action Network (FAN) called "C4C" - which stands for Care for Creation. The plan is to introduce the process to you and then share one of the sessions together. Each session also has a number of resources at the end, and we'll share some of those as well. Additionally, we'll have DVDs of several of the recent webinars and webcasts that FAN and others have offered, including the first webinar presented by Catholic Relief Services (CRS) for the First Courageous Initiative in which NAFRA (and therefore we) are participating in with CRS. We also hope to share with you parts of the webinars "Creativity in Creation" and "Franciscan Values," both of which are being presented by FAN.

So what is the C4C process? The subtitle, "A Franciscan Formation in Environmental Justice and Caring for Creation" is a good summary. Here's part of the introduction published in the facilitators handbook:

Francis did what was his to do. Now this is ours to do. C4C Franciscan Care for Creation is Franciscan Action Network's adult formation program to prepare people for putting faith into action addressing important environmental issues.

Catholic Social Teaching calls us to respond to our ecological vocation, and St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi inspired a vision that can help to do just that. The C4C process is meant to inform, inspire, challenge and invite participants to respond.

This adult formation program is designed as a mini-series of six (6) weekly or bi-weekly sessions. Sessions are led by a facilitator who works with a small group of adult learners. Each session lasts two hours and includes prayer, stories, visuals, readings and discussion. The C4C process will provide learners with an overview of pressing environmental issues (including clean water issues, food security, pollution and climate change), an introduction to a Franciscan perspective on the God-human-Creation relationship, an overview of basic environmental science and ecology, a description of the processes of civic engagement, an explanation of the Franciscan eco-social analysis process, and a role-play scenario to practice applying Franciscan eco-social analysis and responding with action steps. C4C includes a list of resources for further learning, and suggestions and ideas for ways to put faith into action in caring for God's Creation and promoting environmental justice.

The C4C program materials include facilitator's handbook with six session plans, participant handouts, a supplemental DVD with video clips, access to digital slide shows online, and evaluation sheets.... After the C4C program, participants are encouraged to respond with efforts that make a difference. This could include analyzing one's own household or parish ecological footprint, creating a green plan for making your home and parish more sustainable, starting a youth team for engaging in environmental service work, or forming a Caretakers of Creation ministry team to address local ecological sustainability environmental justice issues in a community....

The Franciscan C4C program is not simply an adult education or community information program; it is a Franciscan servant leadership program in Christian discipleship. C4C is explicitly Franciscan in that it fosters ongoing conversion through active engagement in the world and prayer....

I do hope you find this description interesting and will come to the Apostolic Action Workshop to learn more. Letters have been sent to all Ministers in the Region with full information. We'll start at 9 a.m. and be finished by 3 p.m. Cost is \$15 per person to cover cost of materials and food (continental breakfast and lunch). Hope to see you all on Saturday, February 26!
